

Marsha and I met several weeks ago, and planned out details for this year's Institute. Everything looks good!

Within McGill, we have had some administrative changes, and I am very happy about them. The administration of the Institute is being transferred to McGill's Centre for Educational Leadership. This is a unit that does research and training about educational issues, and they have good experience in running training events like ours.

Because they are able to pay instructors, your check this year will be coming from them. Enclosed you will find a contract from them. Please be sure to contact Sylvia Sklar, coordinator of the Centre, if you have any questions about it. I'm sure you will be happy to see that we were able to raise your reimbursement to \$4500.

Please keep all your receipts for expenses. I hope it is not necessary to submit them, but I'm not yet certain. I am trying to get this clarified with McGill.

The Institute is completely full and we have had to turn applicants away. I tried very hard to respect your requests about size limits for your classes. Lots of people are coming in groups - it's very exciting to see teams from the same school board, association or agency.

Dear Marsha & Jack,

They are also 'slumming down' the notional Curriculum and allowing teachers more scope and flexibility in lesson - planning The minister for Education has become "III" and had to go to "Hospital" so he cannot explain why they have made these decisions so soon after their crashing defeat in a vecent by- election.

I will write soon and send you a present, but I thought I'd send this reply quickly in Thanks for the photos. I have a BEAUTY of you and Herb.
