#### MARSHA FOREST AND JACK PEARPOINT

Marsha Forest and Jack Pearpoint are the founders and directors of the Centre for Integrated Education Community and Inclusion Press located in Toronto. This internationally recognized Centre and small press promotes the vision "Kids Belong Together". The mandate of the Centre is to promote "Full Inclusion" - at home, at school, at the workplace, in neighbourhoods and communities. The Centre's basis belief is that "Together We're Better."

Marsha has over 25 years of experience as a teacher and advocate for children and families. She has worked in special education and holds her doctorate in teacher education/leadership and administration. She is a well known and popular keynote speaker, workshop leader and video producer. Jack's 25 years have been in running innovative adult education and literacy organizations. Jack spent 5 years in Nigeria and Ghana with the Canadian University Service Overseas and was President of Frontier College, Canada's oldest adult education institution for over 15 years.

Both Jack and Marsha are affiliated with McGill University. Jack is a Visiting Professor in the faculty of Education Administration. Marsha is the Director of the McGill Summer Institute on Integrated Education and Community.

Jack and Marsha are advocates, writers, lecturers. They are also a husband and wife team travelling the globe together with their message of "full inclusion". Recently they have given courses in England, Wales, the Netherlands, Colorado, California, New Hampshire, Vermont, Missouri and across Canada. Marsha and Jack are above all passionately committed to building a society where "each belongs" and where ability and giftedness replace disability and segregation of any kind. Their seminars and workshops examine options and opportunities for all "at risk groups".



#### Thinking about Diversity

As the growing number of children, parents, and teachers who work to create inclusive schools inspire us with their achievements, our awareness grows of the connections between inclusion for students with disabilities and other efforts to build and strengthen community. As we meet native people, Hispanic people, and African-American people who are reclaiming and renewing their traditions and asserting their sense of justice, we sense that their commitments are importantly linked to ours. As we meet people who are mutually rebuilding their lives out of the challenges of illiteracy, gang membership, life on the street, and imprisonment, we feel the relevance of their struggles to ours. As we meet people who are working to deepen the collective understanding of what education for full citizenship must mean in these conflict ridden, turbulently changing times, we perceive the relevance of their learning for our work. And, we have discovered that our sense of common commitment. common struggle, and common learning is reciprocated: many of the people we meet feel the importance and excitement of creating opportunities for full participation for people with disabilities.

It is time to gather these threads of connection in order to explore the ways in which they interweave. It is time to find ways to gather people with distinct experiences and different perspectives who have a common interest in the work of creating educational communities which celebrate and integrate diversity.

We believe that, like any meaningful education, such gatherings must be founded on common, personal experience. We cannot just read one other's papers or audit each other's speeches: to build a context for understanding we must find ways to share our music, our meals, our dreams and dances, our stories, our uncertainties, and our disagreements. To explore the strengths and challenges of diversity and belonging, we must learn to create diverse gatherings focused on shared learning. We think that such gatherings may reveal that, across real and important ethnic, economic, and experiential differences and despite genuine conflicts, we are at work on a common tapestry.

We plan to explore the possibilities of such gatherings by convening one in Oak Brook (near O'Hare airport) in August 1993. The preliminary design for supporting the gathering includes these elements:

- Invitations to a core group, across international boundaries, who represent diverse experiences and different perspectives on a shared commitment to building communities that value diversity. The core group includes many people who have not met one another, but everyone has a personal relationship with at least one other core group member.
- Person-to-person and public invitations to a wider group in order to further extend and diversity the gathering.
- The clear expectation that all members of the gathering will work together to create a temporary community within which people can discover and explore the lessons in one anther's varied experiences. The core group is not attending in order to instruct or therapize or entertain the other participants. The core group is attending to create a diverse, committed nucleus for the gathering. The wider group is not attending to be trained or treated or entertained. The wider group is attending to create a gathering that will allow everyone to belong and all to share their distinctive gifts.
- The clear expectation that the gathering is based on personal participation and shared activities rather than on consuming a program. Members of the gathering will share their own stories of hope, frustration, anger, grief and learning. Members of the gathering will have opportunities to exchange ideas and to eat, sing and dance together. Every member of the gathering shares responsibility for discovering and creating positive accommodations to individual differences so that all experience a sense of welcome. Every member of the gathering is responsible for defining and enlisting others in positive action within and after the gathering.
- A team of facilitators whose role is to organize the gathering and assist the members of the gathering to remember the expectation that defined the gathering

and to create and schedule ways to learn from one another,

 A comfortable meeting place and sufficient time (five days) for people to meet and learn from one another.

So far, we have scheduled a time: 15-20 August, 1993; selected a theme: "Diversity Gathering '93"; identified a team of facilitators: Marsha Forest, Judith Snow, Jack Pearpoint, Maxine Greene, Mary Falvey, Dan Hurd and George Flynn; confirmed the participation of core group members from the U.S., Canada, Europe and New Zealand; and begun to invite a wider group.

We acknowledge the limitations of this first exploration. Its international nature and residential setting imposes travel and accommodation costs that will limit participation. The decision to compose the core group based on personal links rather than on a more general idea of representativeness means that some experiences and perspectives will be left out. The strong links most of the organizers have to inclusive education for children with disabilities probably means that there will be more people coming from that experience than any other. And, the novelty of the gathering means that there will inevitably be problems in the logistics and the process. Despite these limitations, we feel the urgency of making a start.


