INTEGRATION IN EDUCATION

Integration in education means placing students who are deemed to be "exceptional" (a Ministry term which includes mentally retarded, gifted, learning disabled, etc.) into regular classes in their local neighbourhood schools with their age-appropriate peers and providing the students and teachers with whatever supports are necessary to promote a good education. In other words, it means allowing the student to attend the school and class she/he would attend if she/he were not labelled "exceptional".

As well as being a basic human right, integration has many advantages:

- 1) It encourages the development of positive attitudes on the part of the non-exceptional students and staff and community
- 2) It provides exceptional students with approriate models for learning social and academic skills
- 3) It encourages friendships between exceptional and non-exceptional people
- 4) It provides a good basis from which an exceptional student will grow to live as independently as possible, as a contributing, active, responsible member of a community in adulthood: participating in social, religious, political and recreational activities and and contributing to the workforce.

SUCCESSFUL INTEGRATION IS HAPPENING IN SEVERAL ONTARIO SCHOOL-BOARDS. INTEGRATED EDUCATION IS THE FIRST STEP TOWARDS ENSURING THAT PEOPLE WHO ARE LABELLED "EXCEPTIONAL" WILL BE ABLE TO LEAD "NORMAL" LIVES.
